AWARD' GIVEN AT SHELTON

An adult student who has distinguished himself in academics and service at Shelton State Community College over the past two years has been named the 1991 recipient of the Leo Sumner Award. This award is the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a student at Shelton State Community College and is named in honor of the college's former president, Leo Sumner.

O. T. (Butch) Noland accepted the award during the college's annual Honors Night services which were held Friday, May 24, at 7:30 p. m. in the Skyland Boulevard Campus Auditorium. Noland is a certified respiratory therapy technician and at the age of 38, he decided he wanted to change the direction of his life and career. He entered Shelton State Community College and the institution's electronics program. Over the past two years, Noland has taken numerous courses in the academic and technical areas of the college.

He will leave Shelton State with a 3.7 grade point average. In addition he is a member of the Shelton State Ambassadors, a student public relations organization, and was elected to the SGA Senate in 1990 where he was a member of the Student Services Committee. He also served as a laboratory assistant in the electronics department. Noland attended the college on an academic scholarship and is a member of Phi Theta Kappa, national junior college honorary. He has been named to the Dean's List of the college and was selected for Who's Who Among American Junior College Students. In the community, Noland has been an active member of the Woodland Forrest Elementary School and Westlawn Middle School PTAs. He is a member of the choir at First Weslyan Church and is a member of a contemporary gospel ensemble at the church. Noland also assists the "Young Musicians," a group of young students ranging in ages from four to twelve years.

Noland is married to Regina Gray Noland, and they have two daughters, Meredith Caroline and Whitney Lane.

In another special award, Pauline Boler was named the recipient of the James B. Allen Award, which is given annually to an outstanding student at the college. Recently, Boler was also selected by the college to represent the institution in the Outstanding Student Competition sponsored annually by the Deans of Students Association for Alabama's two year colleges.

Ms. Boler attends Shelton State on an academic scholarship and is majoring in pre-nursing. Graduating with a 3.84 grade point average, Boler has been a member of Phi Theta Kappa, national junior college honorary, and is a member of the Shelton State Ambassadors. She has also served as an officer in the SGA this year. She has been named to the Dean's List at the college and has been selected for Who's Who Among American Junior College Students.

Two students from Shelton have been named by the University of Alabama Alumni Association as recipients of Junior College Honors Scholarships. Students receiving scholarships from the University are Melinda Wheeler and Michelle Hood.

The University of Montevallo awarded a Music Scholarship to Wes Irvin and a Dean's Scholarship to Shana Lynn Reach.

Jean Perry received a Junior College Transfer Scholarship from Birmingham-Southern College and a scholarship from the United Methodist Church.

The University of Alabama in Birmingham awarded Timothy Duncan a Dean's Merit Scholarship. Mike Jones has been named a recipient of a Music Scholarship from Mississippi University for Women.

The Shelton State Foundation awarded two scholarships for 1991-92. Clanton Gregory Freeman will receive a Shelton State Foundation Presidential Scholarship and Carol Rogers was named the recipient of the Belinda Hughes Memorial Scholarship.
